## Ham 16 - Activities Post License

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- 1. Amateur radio has three aspects: technology, mental exercise, and lifestyle or what you do with it.
- 2. After you obtain your ham license, now what?
  - a. Buy your first radio, generally an inexpensive version, until you decide what features you want.
  - b. Program the radio with at least one channel to try it out.
  - c. Get an Elmer to help you find a cable, use Chirp, and program all channels.
  - d. Find a repeater and join a regular net, so you have a place to go in emergencies.
- 3. Your next radio will depend on the activities you want to do.
  - a. Often that is a base/mobile for more reliable network communications.
  - b. The options are myriad from top-grade Icom and Yaesu to less expensive, less performing versions.
  - c. Icom 2730 is 50-watt analog unit that is as simple to use as a hand-held. Digital units have a steep learning curve.
  - d. The base unit will require a power supply and a separate antenna. Mobile will require an antenna.
- 4. To give a greater opportunity for sharing info, learning new stuff, and getting help, we plan regular Show & Tell.
  - a. Usually, the session will be the Second-Saturday at 9:00 AM, for a couple of hours.
  - b. You can request a topic, present a topic, or just come to see what is happening. These will be interactive.
  - c. We will be hands-on. We may build antennas, create computer tools, play Raspberry Pi, demonstrate equipment.
- d. Ham road trips let us see our gorgeous, historic state, with a different perspective and practicing varied radio skills.
- 5. New beginner Technician classes are planned for every other month, as there is interest. Testing will follow completion.
  - a. Let your friends know how they can get started, too. It is that easy to be an Elmer.
  - b. Please let us know, so we can schedule and send them the study material ahead of time.
- 6. We rotate Net Control for on-the-air communications, so many can function in an emergency.
  - a. Not surprisingly, Ham network has a protocol.
  - b. Since the very first days, networks have been used to share and relay information, before telephone was common.
  - c. Do not be shy, the network is the people who will be your contact in an emergency.
  - d. After a few sessions, others will coordinate the network, if interested.
- 7. Initially the Network operated on other groups' repeaters.
  - a. Two organizations offered their systems, but none of the locations are adequate to hit all our hams.
  - b. With many new, active hams, we will have a significant local impact immediately.
- 8. We evaluated building our own repeater.
  - a. That let us locate it where other people are in range.
  - b. It gave us control of the equipment, when we want and need it.
  - c. Obviously, there is construction help needed and cost associated with equipment.
  - d. In amateur radio, everything is accomplished by hams.
  - e. There is no free lunch or government program.
  - f. We can instruct on the technical issues, but some of us Elmer guys are past the time of climbing extension ladders.
- 9. To keep the network going requires significant support from many hams.
  - a. We are not organized as a club, but are just a functional group to help others communicate in an emergency.
  - b. If you see something that you think should be done, welcome.
  - c. Amateur radio is about doing the part that makes sense to you and asking an Elmer for help.
  - d. People come and go and come again, depending on their activities. That's life.
- 10. These are additional coordinators, teams, and activities that you may want to do, if it is your interest.
  - a. Corresponding administrator to keep everyone informed.
  - b. Social media.
  - c. Facilities, arrange where to meet and set-up.
  - d. Field trip and training arrangements.
  - e. Food and drink.
  - f. Check-up on people who have not checked-in lately.
  - g. Emergency preparation, whatever that entails.
  - h. Storm spotter group. National Weather Service classes for hams are generally in February and March.
  - i. The Guy and The Gal
- 11. The one, big thing: To have a network when you need it, you must participate to keep it active, on the air, with people.
- 12. You thought the Ham thing was getting a radio and talking? Well, there is that too! Life is good. Enjoy.
