- 1. Ham Radio is a term about which everyone has an idea.

- 3. A little over a year ago, Dr. Michael decided to have a ham outreach. Jerry talked to Dan and me.
  - a. That is how we and you got here today.
  - b. We have a repeater upstairs. We have a digital radio node connected upstairs.
  - c. We know that means nothing, but the fact shows how far we have come. The equipment gets used daily.
  - d. We will get back to how that fits in.
- 4. What did your telephone look like when you were young? What does it look like today?
  - a. The same thing has happened in amateur radio. Much of communications technology develops with ham radio.
  - b. Pro vs Am in golf, what is the difference. Ham is the same thing: professionals, but do not get paid.
  - c. Amateur is all volunteer, which folks have hard time believing. Someone will help you.
- 5. First thing people think is emergency. We have that covered. We will talk about a few different set-ups.
  - a. Clear your thoughts, ham is simply communications. FCC and international allocate spectrum to experiment.
    - b. We have radios at home. No one can see most of our antennas. Things are different.
    - c. We have radios in our vehicles. Most cannot tell. No one can recognize most antennas. Things are different.
    - d. We have digital radios, small and powerful to talk to anyone anywhere anytime. Things are different.
    - e. We have back-up. What happens when the lights go out. It gets dark, but the ham shack has light and can talk.
    - f. Rosemary & I went to Storm Spotters class 2-weeks ago and saw Jim Brandt and his wife there.
    - g. Others went to different sessions.
- 6. Yes, some still build things. Some do not. If you want, someone will help. Is that right?
- 7. Dan will talk about Simplex Allstar and its emergency capability.
- 8. Scooter will talk about RF-less Allstar, its simplicity, and how it replaces antennas.
- I have a complete base station set-up that I carry in this case. Dan has a similar set-up he uses with ARES.
  a. Power supply with back-up batteries; Radio; Antenna & coax
- 10. There are no you-gottas. You do what you want. We have pages of suggestions on the evergreen website.
- 11. How do you become a ham?
  - a. We do not ask your background. We only ask if you want to be a ham.
  - b. Regardless of background we can make you one, if you want it.

  - e. We wrote the manual. It is just like a driver's license exam. We give you the exact questions. We send you a pdf.

  - g. For most, they can pass with 5 or more readings. Over achievers that want 99 read seven or so times.
