1. Field days are out-of-doors, in unfamiliar territory to some, in nature with associated risks. Nature is at once beautiful, refreshing, and intriguing.

- 2. It is the best place to practice meditation, outdoor skills, and ham radio. There are activities for all age-groups, including those of us with years.
- 3. Activities in nature are different from a mowed lawn in the city.
 - a. Be aware, be prepared, and care for your group.
 - b. Wear appropriate clothing, foot-cover, and head-cover.
 - c. Use safe skin care and insect repellent. Essential oils work well.
 - d. Bring hand sanitizer / cleaner.
- 4. Bring your own food and drink. Each person has different needs. Stay hydrated and nourished. The negative effects come on suddenly.
- Please respect the outdoors and others. Be couth. Don't leave debris. Bring trash bags to take out what you bring in.
- 6. Nature calls are taken care of in nature. Find a tree you like. A Porta-John is behind the barn at the end of the road.
- 7. Depending on activity, bring your chairs, equipment, and power.
- 8. No smoking, fires, or open flames. Forest undercover and tallgrass prairie makes for wildfire.
- 9. Oklahoma laws apply to all firearms, open-carrying, and usage. Follow those. Be aware. People may be strolling in the forest, walking the trails, and kids running. Keep them safe!
- 10. The terrain is uneven. Walking sticks are suggested. The west is relatively flat, where I walk. The east is gorgeous with 23% grade, huge rocks, and steep ravines.
- 11. If disoriented, walk uphill. If on top, walk east.
 A limestone rock road cuts the center. Numerous trails crisscross.
- 12. Three ponds invite fishing. Enjoy and be careful. One is 12-feet deep.
- 13. Normal activity may encounter a variety of Oklahoma wildlife.
 - a. We see deer, coyotes, bobcats, mountain lions, fox, squirrels, bunnies, badger, raccoons, opossum and others. See nature blend.
 - b. We see eagles, turkeys, turkey vultures, red-tailed hawks, owls, and myriad birds not normally seen in town.
 - c. A neighboring property owner recorded a black bear on their game camera. We have seen the footprints.
 - d. There is an innate fear and respect for humans by all these critters. Still give them their freedom. It is their home.
- 14. Plants are beautiful, some are food and medicine, some are not your friend. Learn to identify poison ivy, et al!
- 15. Bugs have a valuable place in nature. Chiggers, ticks, scorpions, and spiders do not, but they are around anyway.
- 16. Snakes are denizens of all rural Oklahoma.
- 17. Stay alert. Take care of you and yours.
- 18. Have fun. Nature is gracious, if you respect it and unforgiving if you do not.

19. The ranch is a registered Oklahoma Agritourism site. Their signs are at the gate and other locations. The state explicitly expects visitors to be responsible for themselves and their activities.
